Fact Sheet on Types of Drugs pt. 2

Antidepressants

These drugs are used to treat many disorders, such as clinical depression, panic attacks, obsessive compulsive disorder, and bulimia. Designed to elevate mood. There are three types of antidepressants currently on the market: Tricyclics, SSRIs and MAOIs. While tricyclics and MAOIs were once prescribed frequently, SSRIs are prescribed more frequently as they have fewer side effects. Antidepressants do have some depressant qualities and should not be mixed with alcohol and other depressant drugs.

Tricyclics:

- Amitriptyline (Elavil)
- Desipramine (Norpamin)
- Trimipramine (Surmontil)
- Doxepin (Sinequan)
- Clomipramine (Anafranil)
- Imipramine (Tofranil)

SSRIs:

- Fluoxetine (Prozac)
- Fluvoxamine (Luvox)
- Venlafaxine (Effexor)
- Sertraline (Zoloft)

MAOIs:

- Tranylcypromine (Pamate)
- Phenelzine (Nardil)
- Moclobemide (Manerix)

Remember to consult your pharmacist before using over-the-counter, herbal or recreational drugs (e.g. alcohol) if you are taking anti-depressants or any other prescription medication.

Anabolic Steroids

These drugs are performance enhancing, and can contain either natural or synthetic testosterone (the male sex hormone). Used mainly in veterinary medicine, they have a few human treatment applications as well. Used to enhance muscle development and endurance, they can do serious damage and have therefore been banned by many sport management and regulatory groups.
